2021: STRENGTH TO MOTION

The scenario caused by the COVID-19 pandemic is challenging for everyone and has been dragging on since March 2020. For us at Fraternity without Borders, the challenges drive us to strengthen the movement and expand our outreach work.

In 2021, we decided to look after street abandoned children in the Democratic Republic of Congo, with the launch of our 11th Project - Orphans of Congo. We expanded our actions for homeless people in Brazil and in the United States with the inauguration of the Reference Reception Center in Rio de Janeiro and in three US cities with the delivery of meals and clothes. We launched the FWB's first educational program, Bottles by the Sea. In Madagascar, we inaugurated the Piece Camp Shelter Center, with capacity to serve up to 3,500 children and 600 adults.

We ran two emergency campaigns, one to treat malnourished children in Madagascar and the other for families affected by floods in Northern Brazil.

We strengthened our mission with the "First Meeting of FWB Volunteers", the "Volunteer Portal", and a series of live broadcasts about our projects.

We have reinforced the importance of sponsorship with the possibility of a new modality, corporate sponsorship, for companies with a monthly contribution of R\$500. This way, companies and individuals can join our cause and give continuity to our humanitarian aid work, which reaches 34,000 people in eight countries.

And we want to do more and more every day. We want the message of fraternity to be more widespread and experienced in all parts of the world, and so our efforts continue in all ways.

Many transformations and all by the union of sponsors and many other people who believe in a better world! Our gratitude for following together in the cause of fraternity!










AREAS OF PERFOMANCE



Since 2009, Fraternity without Borders has been uniting hearts around the world, encouraging and enabling thousands of people to experience fraternity! It is through this union that, today, we take humanitarian aid to the most challenging places in the world. Operating in eight countries (Brazil, Haiti, Madagascar, Malawi, Mozambique, Democratic Republic of Congo, United States, and Senegal), we coordinate, manage, and embrace many works.

Together, we take in 34,494 brothers and sisters, provide food, medical care, vocational training, access to education, sustainable agriculture, build houses, and support projects that help children with rare diseases.

This fraternal movement, written by many hands, has made it possible that for a path of 12 years of work, 74 work centers have been implemented, 22 artesian wells have been drilled, 298 houses have been built, 3 bakeries and 22 production workshops have been implemented. Altogether, 529 thousand meals are served per month in the projects maintained by the organization. Besides providing access to education for 1182 young people, 7 of them university students.

In sub-Saharan Africa, specifically in Madagascar, Mozambique, and Malawi, we also supported 599 elderlies, helping them with food and building houses for them to live in. We were able to provide work for 579 people of the adult population, through training and production workshops.

FWB considers that there are direct and indirect areas among our activities. The direct ones are

those that have a specific project in a certain location in the world, and which receive sponsorship through the FWB. Currently, 11 projects work in this format, in Brazil and Africa. The indirect ones include some specific works, in which we help with some donations received, that is what happens in Haiti and Mozambique; and that is why it appears in our accountability.


INDIRECT AREAS OF OPERATION

In Haiti, we work with the Gnosis School, located in the city of Hinche. There, 198 children are cared for and fed.

In the Dondo district, in Mozambique/Africa, we support the work developed by Pastor Pedro, offering food for about 300 children. In the district of Búzi, Mozambique, we are contributing to the construction of the Children's Village Orphanage, which, when finished, will house 80 orphans and/ or socially vulnerable children.

In Tete, a province in the central region of Mozambique, we contribute to Dona Laura Orphanage, which shelters about 60 children.

HEADQUARTERS AND INTERNATIONAL BRANCHES

FWB Headquarters in Brazil - works to carry out our Mission with a structure that include the Administrative, Financial, Communication and Marketing, Relationship, Gift Center, Fundraising and Projects, Auditing and Project Controller areas.

International Branches - work to spread FWB cause and take the message of fraternity to more people, with the objective of bringing more volunteers and sponsors together. It is worth mentioning that the activities of the United Kingdom branch are focused on the Welcome Mozambique Project.





A fraternal movement will always be a story written by many hands. The Fraternity without Borders (FWB) was born from the heart of one man, but it has reached and helps more people every day through the union of many fraternal hearts.

Wagner Moura Gomes, the founder-president of the FWB, was just a boy when he found himself crying over world hunger. A pain that accompanied him throughout his youth, when he already dedicated himself to volunteer work in the outskirts of Campo Grande/MS, his hometown.

As an adult, no longer able to avoid this call, he decided to go to Africa.

He chose Mozambique, a Portuguese-speaking country located in the poorest region of the world, Sub-Saharan Africa. That was the beginning of Fraternity without Borders' welcoming work, which today has expanded into all the areas of action presented.

From those early days to today, a series of happy events, sponsors and friends of the cause, have been weaving this story of fraternity.

SHELTER MOZAMBIQUE

Mozambique, the country where FWB began to take its first steps, now has 34 work centers, 30 of them are Reception Centers. We welcome 13,913 people (among children, adults, and elderlies), who receive food, health care, hygiene guidance, professionalizing workshops, and participate in pedagogical, recreational, and cultural activities.

The humanitarian aid that reaches the country, through many fraternal hands, is what ensures that hundreds of people have food. Mozambique is among the 16 countries at high risk of increasing levels of acute hunger, against a global backdrop of new record high levels of acute food insecurity, according to a United Nations (UN) report. The number of people facing a food crisis or emergency may have reached 1.7 million.

This reality is transformed through humanitarian work. Our union changes the reality of the local population. Today, we are already acting in 30 villages with our shelters. Our mission is, in addition to providing food and assistance, to offer tools for the welcomed to conquer their autonomy and take the fraternal mission further.

Since the opening of the first reception center in Mozambique, in 2010, the work has had a great outcome. Currently, seven youngsters - who arrived at FWB as children, are already university students, and in 2021, we will celebrate the graduation of Especiosa Marge, with a degree in Biology and Chemistry.

The local landscape is modified by the work in the "machambas" (vegetable gardens).



In all, there are 11: seven active and four in restructuring. A tractor, a motor pump, and pipes were purchased to help in the preparation of the soil and irrigation. The food, so scarce in the country, now sprouts from the earth and reaches the plates of our guests, making the meals more nutritious and healthier. After an interrupted operation period, the meals are back to being served in the centers, three times a week.

We encourage the practice of sports, local culture with music and art workshops, we offer professional qualification with workshops in biochar, baking, sewing, agroforestry and carpentry, to provide independence and dignity. An agronomist engineer and three teachers were hired to teach rugby, carpentry, and traditional dance classes. A sand court was built, and the bakery and carpentry shop were remodeled and expanded.

ACT MADAGASCAR



We arrived in the south of the island of Madagascar, in Ambovombe, the place that houses our first Reception Center, in 2017. Since then, together, sponsors, volunteers, and supporters of the cause, have welcomed brothers and sisters suffering one of the worst humanitarian crises in the world: hunger.

Currently, we welcome 16 thousand brothers and sisters in our 13 Reception Centers, where we work to offer food, hygiene care, recreation and cultural activities, training for workshops or sewing, agroforestry, biochar, soap, handcraft, rust, and ecological bricks. We have also implemented a bakery, to produce bread for consumption by the local community and to generate income for the workers involved in the production.

In 2021, we had to take a closer look at the nutritional situation of our children in Madagascar. Drought, lost crops, sandstorms, pandemic that closed borders and worsened the recession in the country, and food with skyrocketing prices. All this caused the famine to take on a proportion that is called The Great Famine. The scenario demanded action. With the SOS Madagascar Campaign, we sought resources to ensure the nutritional treatment of at least 1600 children who were already being served by the Madagascar Action Project.

ACT MADAGASCAR



We built another Nutrition Center in Madagascar. The community of Marafono now has monthly visits from our collaborators and volunteers, who provide meals for the residents. Before FWB arrived there, the only food available was fruit and cactus leaves – that was what they used to eat to satisfy hunger.

The inauguration of the new Peace Camp, in Madagascar, allowed an expansion in the services provided by the Medical Clinic. We now have two pavilions, which house 16 rooms and 24 regular beds for hospitalization. The facility also has sinks for sanitation, gynecological tables and stretchers, and a vaccination room.

The nutritional treatment is long and slow, because the children need to regain weight, nutrients and important substances for development, such as: zinc, protein, water, sugar, among others. Monthly, the families receive rice, oil, and beans to prepare the meals; and, through food points, children in the communities receive meals six times a week.

In addition to the Medical Clinic, the Peace Camp also has a larger dining hall equipped to serve more than four thousand meals a day. The space was planned to accommodate up to 800 people at a time. And bathing, so rare in Madagascar, is even more accessible - there are 40 showers that works at the same time. Every detail impacts the daily lives of thousands of families.

UBUNTU NATION

Next to the Dzaleka refugee camp in Malawi/ Africa, which houses about 52 thousand refugees in a space built for only 10 thousand people to live, the Ubuntu Nation project emerges as a space where war refugees can find help and learn skills to gain independence.

To provide safe homes for dozens of families who arrive in Malawi and, for the ones living in the transit area (space reserved to house war refugees until they can afford to build their own homes), we started the ongoing campaign Heart Houses - Malawi, which aims to raise funds to the restauration and construction of houses in the area.

In 2021, 83 houses were built and delivered to families living in the transit area. The cost to build a house in the area is around \$2,000 dollars (about R\$10,000), and the action has restored dignity and provided a safe home for dozens of beneficiaries.

In the project, agroforestry, biochar, sewing, and soap workshops were developed to generate income and enable those welcomed to work. Through these actions, the FWB has promoted jobs. In all, we have 137 employees.

Ubuntu Nation Project has 10 hectares of land to develop agroforestry. There are 6 employees to carry out this activity with the objective of becoming sustainable in the production of food to supply the demands of the project itself, as well as to generate income through sales.

The biochar workshop is a sustainable solution that aims to reduce deforestation by using energy that comes from nature and is not harmful. It is an activity that involves 10 workers in the production of biochar and helps in the generation of income and for local consumption. Currently, briquettes are made daily.

The soaps produced by the project's beneficiaries



received quality certification by the government of Malawi this way they could be sold in the markets. Part of the soap production is sold to generate income and the other part is included in the food & supplies boxes distributed to the families, children, and volunteers.

In 2021, the capacity to accommodate children at Ubuntu School was expanded. There was a celebration for the graduation of 90 pre-school students who went on to elementary school. With the opening of the new classes, the children have the chance to continue their studies, new teachers were hired and received training and pedagogical training based on the Montessori method - taught by Malawian teacher-consultant, Tisungane Howa. Currently, there are 322 students enrolled in kindergarten and elementary school, and 60 babies in the nursery. The children receive food, school supplies, and school uniforms.

In the Dzaleka Refugee Camp, a Medical Clinic was created through the initiative of a Congolese doctor. The site has a laboratory and hospitalization area, as well as an outpatient clinic, a pharmacy, and a department for nutritional rehabilitation and physiotherapy. Fraternity without Borders helps with donations

of medicines for the clinic's pharmacy, facilitating access to those in need.



BRAZIL, A HEART THAT WELCOMES

The United Nations (UN) estimates that more than 262,000 Venezuelans live in Brazil, more than 30,000 in the state of Roraima, which is the main gateway for them to get into the country. Many of them were and still are living on the streets.

The project Brazil, a Heart That Welcomes was a pioneer in the region, even before the arrival of the UNHCR (UN Refugee Agency) and the installation of Operation Acolhida, the Brazilian army operation organized in response to the refugee and migration crisis in Brazil.

In 2021, in Boa Vista - capital of the State of Roraima, 993 people were hosted by the FWB at the Emergencial Area Setptember 13th (Espaço Emergencial 13 de Setembro) and at São Vicente 2 Reception Center, the latter being considered a model reception center by Operation Acolhida.

In one year, the Reference and Training Center in Paracaima, aided 1,046 people, 1,008 of them with professional qualification in six different classes, among Venezuelan migrants and refugees, Venezuelan and Brazilian natives.

Eln 2021, the project became even more concerned with Sustainability and installed an Aquaponics system at the Emergencial Area Setptember 13th, a vegetable garden, and a biodigester at São Vicente 2 Reception Center.

Allied to this, the relocations remain the focus of the project's activities. In 2021, 68 families who lived in Roraima, but not necessarily in



the Reception Centers, were relocated to other states, a total of 228 people. There were 34 families relocated by social reunion, 24 by family reunification, 8 by voluntary fostering, and 2 by the institutional modality. The main destinations were the South and Southeast regions.

Fifteen family nuclei went to the state of Santa Catarina, 12 to São Paulo, 10 to Rio Grande do Sul, 6 to Paraná and 5 to Minas Gerais.

CHEMIN DU FUTUR

In Senegal, the Chemin Du Futur Project celebrated the 10th anniversary of its foundation with its first high school student. The project embraced by FWB offers education, housing, and food to boys in vulnerable situations in Senegal. The work is a breath of for an estimation of more than 50 thousand boys living in street situations and extreme vulnerability in Dakar, the Senegalese capital.

Aiming to go further and be the protagonist of his own story, Eric Ndecky dedicated himself to his studies and passed the Liceu - the entrance exam for high school applied in Dakar, Senegal. The achievement of the boy who lived on the streets and had no prospects for his life is a milestone for the continuity of the work. Three years from now, Eric will have the opportunity to go to college.

The educational part has a very strong emphasis in the project, for this reason a private teacher was hired for the math activities. Previously the tutoring was provided by the project's own monitors. The classes take place twice a week and are divided into two groups, according to the students' level. Besides the reinforcement in exact sciences, the students also participate in English classes.

The bakery started operating again at the end of

the year with an average of 100 loaves of bread per day. The project performed maintenance on the bakery's oven with the goal of starting the "social business" plan.



PORTRAITS OF HOPE



Portraits of Hope Project, supported by FWB since 2018, operates in the Backlands of Bahia and other regions in extreme poverty in this state, offering, with the help of volunteers, housing for families living in conditions of social vulnerability, tutoring, medical and psychological care, music, and capoeira classes.

In Canudos, Village of Hope (Vila Esperança) has been gaining new houses, replacing the mud houses, and offering a safe home for the sheltered families. Our goal is to offer quality

of life to the needy community through the distribution of water, basic sanitation, education, and income generation.

Currently, we welcome 365 families, 244 of them in Canudos, 48 in Valente, 38 in Retirolândia and 35 in Jacobina - a total of 1,424 people.

1424 ACCOMODATED 7 HOUSES DELIVERED

In 2021, the community kitchen was inaugurated in Village of Hope where it is possible, on average, to offer 3,100 meals to the community of the region. In addition, a vegetable garden is being cultivated to provide fresh food and to help in the early childhood education of the residents.

In the clinical area, a new infirmary room was built for basic care and assistance to the community. In addition, a water tank was installed to supply water to the families that were further away from the project center, about three kilometers.

A car was also purchased to help in this distribution to the most distant families.

GARDEN OF BUTTERFLIES

In Caculé (BA) we support the NGO Garden of Butterflies, which takes in children diagnosed with Epidermolysis Bullosa (EB) - a rare disease that affects the skin and causes serious wounds. It is through sponsorship that these children receive help and assistance in their treatment.

Currently, 103 children are hosted in 21 Brazilian states and the Federal District. Every month, each child receives a box with medicines, dressings, and supplements that are of essential use for each one. In addition to nursing and psychological care, support for medical care, and social assistance.

The treatment of EB is expensive. On average, it can cost between R\$3,000 and R\$40,000 per month for each patient. This amount includes the purchase of bandages, supplements, ointments, and medical care. With such a costly treatment, many of the patients depend exclusively on the work of the project to have more quality of life and less pain.

Nowadays, we receive children from the states of Bahia, Minas Gerais, São Paulo, Pernambuco, Rio de Janeiro, Maranhão, Piauí, Acre, Mato Grosso, Mato Grosso do Sul, Goiás, Distrito Federal, Ceará, Paraíba, Rio Grande do Norte, Paraná, Espírito Santo, Sergipe, Pará, Amazonas, Roraima, and Santa Catarina. São Paulo has the largest number of people sheltered, 20, followed by Minas Gerais with 19 and Maranhão with 13.





MICROCEPHALY: LOVE WITHOUT DIMENSIONS

In 2021, we strengthened the mission of Microcephaly, Love without Dimensions, a project supported by the FWB since 2017. Adaptations were made in all reception units so that clinical care could be provided to patients in the face of the restrictions imposed by the pandemic.

In Maceió (AL), at the unit Collective Love without Dimensions, in partnership with the Family of Angels Association of Alagoas (AFAEL), 30 patients received treatment with physical therapy and speech therapy sessions. In Campina Grande (PB), the Center for Integral Care of Children with Microcephaly, of Professor Joaquim Amorim Neto Research Institute, offered care to 120 patients. In Belo Horizonte (MG), the unit treated 30 patients with microcephaly.

In addition to the three work centers in Brazil, in Angola/Africa, children receive physiotherapy care remotely. To this end, the project has made modems and cell phones available to Angolan mothers, so they can connect to the Internet and perform physiotherapy exercises on their children under the guidance of our professionals. Food supplement, food/drink thickener, diapers, and hygiene products are also made available, so that the children receive adequate treatment. 06 children receive medical follow-up.

With COVID-19 vaccination advanced throughout the country, and the children in the Project immunized, the services, exams, and activities have returned in person.

To care for the children, there is a multidisciplinary team, made up of physiotherapists, psychologists, and doctors, who offer the families the opportunity for adequate treatment.



FRATERNITY ON THE STREET

Fraternity on the Street Project has started to transform the lives of homeless people in Brazil and in the United States. With five poles of action spread throughout Brazil in the states of Mato Grosso do Sul, Rio de Janeiro, Minas Gerais and São Paulo -, in 2021 the project expanded new fronts of action to the United States. The fraternity has reached further and embraced brothers and sisters in need of help.

In June, in Rio de Janeiro, the Welcomed Reference Center (Centro de Acolhimento Referência) was inaugurated, with at least 200 services per day, including haircuts, medical, psychological, and social services, and meals.


In addition to the project's five centers in Brazil, three new work centers have started operating in the United States, in the cities of Las Vegas, New York, and Denver. Every weekend, volunteers from the three centers get together to prepare and distribute, on average, 500 packed lunches to people in situations of social vulnerability on the American streets.

Clothes, shoes, sheets, towels, blankets, and personal hygiene products are also distributed. The growth of the activities ensures that more hearts are embraced.

YOUNG EMMANUEL PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA

The second semester of 2021 marked the return of face-to-face classes for the 92 students enrolled in the Orchestra at three hubs. Previously, classes were hybrid, split into online and in person due to the restrictions imposed by the CO-VID-19 pandemic.


Children from 8 years old to youngsters up to 16 years old in socially vulnerable situations in Campo Grande – MS, are the target audience of this project. They can learn about and play eight types of instruments: violin, viola, cello, bass, flute, clarinet, trumpet, and saxophone.

The classes are held in the project's partner venues, on alternate days. As they evolve, they become part of the Young Emmanuel Philharmonic Orchestra. The contact with music awakens new values and often transforms relationships with school, family, and friends.

Aunt More School (Escolinha Tia More), at Jardim Canguru neighborhood, in Campo Grande - MS, was the project's new testing center in 2021. There were 28 students with viola, violin, cello and flute lessons three times a week. Meals and food boxes were also offered to the families.

A new feature in 2021 was the closing of the activities with a presentation open to the public called "Songs in Concert", with the participation of 35 orchestra members.



ORPHANS OF CONGO

In November 2021, Fraternity Without Borders launched its 11th project: Orphans of Congo, with the objective of sheltering orphaned children in extremely vulnerable situations in the streets of the Democratic Republic of Congo, mainly in the cities of Bukavu and Goma.

The project started by supporting orphanages and currently runs a shelter center to provide food, housing, education, medical care, and security for orphaned children, mothers, and pregnant women in the aftermath of armed conflict in the country.

United, we have overcome borders and reached the most challenging places to welcome our brothers and sisters who need it the most. In this 12-year journey, there are many stories and fraternal experiences that touch us. Those who welcome and those who are/were welcomed merge in a feeling that has the power to transform the world: Love.

And to share some of the incredible stories of our fraternal mission, in our site, under "Contents", in News/Blog, we publish beautiful articles about how each person part of up FWB family has taken this mission further and contributed to making the world a more fraternal place. In "News", there is always the most current content of each of our steps, and you can follow the progress and challenges of the projects, because transparency and disclosure of the cause is very important to us.



ACTIONS & EVENTS

In 2021, FWB and the volunteer force held at least 60 events with FWB presence or dissemination that can be checked in our FWB Tour/Tour FWB. Live broadcasts, through FWB 's social networks, explained the functioning of the organization's projects.

There were four events with the participation of coordinators, beneficiaries and volunteers of each work in Brazil and Africa. Even in a virtual way, it was possible to strengthen the fraternal feeling and bring together many hands in the service of love.

In September, in an online event, a new way of sponsorship was launched, the business one. From now on, companies can contribute monthly and permanently, starting at R\$ 500, directed to one or more FWB projects, regardless of size and business segment.

FWB's first educational program, Bottles by the Sea, was launched with the purpose of preparing students as agents of change in the world through feelings of empathy and fraternity in the school environment.

In both modalities, the amounts collected will be reverted to the construction of schools, acquisition of school materials and pedagogical support in the educational activities developed in the organization's projects.

INSTITUTIONAL CAMPAIGNS



SOS Madagascar - the campaign sought resources to ensure the nutritional treatment for at least 1,600 children who were already being cared for by the Madagascar Action project.



Together for Acre – for two months, FWB together with the Spiritist Federation of the State of Acre collected kits for 304 residents, among them immigrants, indigenous people, adults, and children. The items collected were clothes, shoes, bed and bath clothes, as well as food, hygiene and cleaning materials.



Manaus, we are together - the emergency campaign collected, in 45 days, 300 food boxes and two months of temporary rent for 52 families affected by the flooding of the Negro and Solimões Rivers, in the state of Amazonas. In addition, part of the money collected was used to buy furniture and utensils for the families and materials for the Emergency Health Caravan, which provided 2,000 medical consultations.



Congo Christmas - the FWB's Christmas Campaign was geared towards taking in orphaned and abandoned children from the streets of the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Water Africa - the campaign aims to raise donations for the drilling of artesian wells in sub-Saharan Africa.



Curumin Heart – to provide sustainable possibilities, food, hygiene items, protective equipment, and water to indigenous



Children's Village - in Búzi, Mozambique - Africa, children in vulnerable situations need a warm and safe home after the region was affected by the cyclone Idai. With the support of Soul Frater, the goal is to build an orphanage for orphaned and vulnerable children.



Dona Laura Welcoming House - in Tete, Mozambique - Africa, the work is on behalf of children who have been abandoned by their families by providing housing, education, drinking water, regular meals, and access to



Heart Houses - the goal of the campaign is to assist in covering, renovating, and building houses and feeding families in the refugee camp in Dzaleka in Malawi.

We value transparency and, above all, the encouragement and experience of fraternity. And that is why all of those who contribute to this movement can see the work up close.

The caravans make it possible for sponsors to experience the reality that they help to change, daily, with their donations, actions, and initiatives. It is also because of this proximity that we can form a network of volunteers who are so committed and involved with the cause. In our caravans we take, through our sponsors, medicine, clothes, food, and health care, which is very precarious in all the places where we work. Through them, each caravanner gets to know the local reality from up close and connects with those who are welcomed in a unique and profound way.


In 2021, with the restrictions due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the FWB caravans were suspended. We only carried out the Emergency Health Caravan, which provided 2,000 medical services between July 10th and 15th, in the Mauazinho neighborhood, in Manaus, and in the Cacau Pirera district, in Iranduba, for families affected by the flooding of the Negro and Solimões Rivers, in the state of Amazonas.


