2022: A YEAR OF MANY BREAKTHROUGHS

All the work proposed by Fraternity without Borders throughout the 13 years of its foundation is always challenging and demands a sincere, joint, continuous, and strong action from all of us: volunteers, sponsors, collaborators, caravanners, and friends of the cause.

In 2022, we can say that we achieved one of those dreams that seemed so far away, but we knew how important and necessary it was, so we did not give up on it: Madagascar has clean drinking water for our guests! This achievement belongs to all of us! It symbolizes the work of so many hearts and the certainty that we can dream and make it happen. It was challenging, it required technique, resources, and a lot of dedication.

The first artesian well was drilled in the City of Fraternity, it releases 3,900 liters of water, which is three times the capacity planned at the beginning of the drilling project, and supplies at least 30,000 people in the community. This clean, drinking water is used for bathing, personal hygiene, preparing meals, irrigation for growing food, and dignity! Also in the year 2022 we moved forward on the Congo Orphans Project in the Democratic Republic of Congo, with the inauguration of the FWB's first shelter center to receive children rescued from the streets of the Democratic Republic of Congo, with safety, food, housing, education, and medical assistance.

In Malawi, our eyes turned to refugee women, widows, and single mothers who in desperation sought prostitution as the only way to support their children. We created the Mothers of the Field initiative by offering jobs in food crops within our Ubuntu Nation project. In one year, 270 women were rescued from an extreme situation of violence and welcomed with decent jobs and a fraternal collective embrace.

We celebrated the graduation of our first sheltered graduate: Especiosa Marge, in the Shelter Mozambique Project; we expanded our actions for homeless people with chemical addiction and inaugurated the second unit of the Soul Clinic, in Uberlândia - MG; and we also launched our FWB Podcast, with the first episode: Missions of Love - full of exciting stories.

We carried out several emergency and permanent campaigns, including the donation of school kits for the children of our project in Madagascar; support for families affected by floods in the mountainous area of Rio de Janeiro, in the city of Petrópolis; support for the Danilo Faria School in Madagascar; and two campaigns for the expansion of the shelter for orphaned children in the Democratic Republic of Congo, one being the raffle of costumes, donated by actor Paulo Gustavo's family members, of the character Dona Herminia, from the movie "Minha Mãe é uma Peça", which also benefited refugee children in Malawi, through the Ubuntu Nation Project.

We were able to meet again in person, exchange hugs, and reinforce our mission during the 5th Fraternity without Borders Meeting in Uberlândia, Minas Gerais, on November 11, 12, and 13, 2022.

We reinforced the importance of sponsorship, creating the possibility of contributions starting at R\$25 per month. Thus, more people were able to join our cause and continue our humanitarian aid work. In addition, this year we received two more directors (volunteers) to join our board: ngela Araújo and Giovanna Gadia, and we are sure that they will be two great forces in our movement.

And we want to do even more every day. We want the message of fraternity to be even more widespread and experienced in all parts of the world, and so our efforts are ongoing in all possibilities.

Many transformations and all by the union of sponsors, and many people who believe in a better world!

Our gratitude for going forward together with us for this cause of fraternity!










AREAS OF PERFOMANCE



Since 2009, Fraternity without Borders has been uniting hearts around the world, encouraging and enabling thousands of people to experience fraternity. It is because of this union that today we take humanitarian aid to the most challenging places in the world. With operations in eight countries (Brazil, Madagascar, Malawi, Mozambique, Democratic Republic of Congo, United States, Senegal, and Haiti), we coordinate, manage, and embrace many works.

Together, we take in more than 34,000 siblings, provide food, medical care, vocational training, access to education, sustainable farming, the building of houses, and support projects that help children with rare diseases..

This fraternal movement, written by many hands, has made possible for 74 work centers to be implemented, more than 20 artesian wells and more than 290 houses built, bakeries and more than 20 production workshops implemented in 13 years of work. Altogether, more than 500 thousand meals are served each month in the projects maintained by the organization. As well as providing access to education for more than 110 young people, some of whom are already university students.

In sub-Saharan Africa, specifically in Madagascar, Mozambique, and in Malawi, we also supported 599 elderly people, helping them with food and building houses. For the adult population, we were able to provide work for more than 500 people through training and production workshops.

AREAS OF PERFOMANCE



Among our regions of action, we consider that there are direct and indirect areas. The direct ones are those that have a specific project in a certain location in the world, and which receive sponsorship through the FWB. Currently, 11 projects work in this format, in Brazil and in Africa. The indirect ones include some specific works, in which we help with other donations received, as it happens in Haiti and in some localities in Mozambique and Madagascar (besides our own projects); and that is why it appears in our accountability.

INDIRECT AREAS OF ACTIVITY


In Haiti, we work with the Gnosis School, located in the city of Hinche. There, 184 children are cared for and fed.

In the Dondo district, in Mozambique/Africa, we support the work developed by Pastor Pedro Manuel, offering food for 300 children. In the district of Búzi, Mozambique, we contributed to the Orphanage Vila das Crianças, which shelters 50 orphans and/or children in situations of social vulnerability with housing, education and food.

In Tete, a province in the central region of Mozambique, we have contributed to the Avó Teresa Shelter Home, which used to be called Dona Laura's Orphanage, which shelters 75 children and teenagers.

In Madagascar, the Danilo Faria School receives funds from FWB to pay the salaries of the 14 teachers, two assistants, and three cleaning personnel. 510 students are enrolled in te school.

Centers Abroad - work to spread the FWB cause and take the message of fraternity to more people, aiming to bring more volunteers and sponsors together. It is worth mentioning that the activities in the United Kingdom concentrate on the Shelter Moçambique project, and the Canadian center works with the projects Garden of Butterflies, Ubuntu Nation, and Madagascar Action.





A fraternal movement will always be a story written by many hands. Fraternity without Borders (FWB) was born in the heart of one man, but it has reached and helps more people every day through the union of many fraternal hearts.

Wagner Moura Gomes, the founder and president of FWB, was just a boy when he found himself crying over world hunger. A pain that accompanied him throughout his youth, when he already dedicated himself to volunteer work in the outskirts of Campo Grande/MS, his hometown. As an adult, no longer able to avoid this call, he decided to go to Africa.

He chose Mozambique, a Portuguese-speaking country located in the poorest part of the world, Sub-Saharan Africa. That was the beginning of Fraternity without Borders' welcoming work, which today has expanded into all the areas of activity presented.

From those early days to today, a series of happy events, together with sponsors and friends of the cause, have been weaving this story of brotherhood.

WELCOMING MOZAMBIQUE

Mozambique, the country where FWB began to take its first steps, now has 34 work centers, 30 of which are Reception Centers and 4 are supported. We shelter 13,889 people (among children, adults, and elderly), who receive food, health care, hygiene orientation, workshops, and participate in pedagogical, recreational, and cultural activities.

The humanitarian aid that reaches the country, through many fraternal hands, is what ensures that thousands of people have something to eat. Mozambique is among the 16 countries at high risk of increasing levels of acute hunger, against a global backdrop of new record high levels of acute food insecurity, according to a United Nations (UN) report. The number of people facing a food crisis or emergency may have reached 1.7 million.

This reality is transformed through humanitarian work. Our union changes the reality of the local population. Today, we are already present in 30 villages with our shelters. Our mission is, in addition to providing food and assistance, to offer support so that the recipients gain autonomy and take the fraternal mission further.

Since the opening of the first welcome center in Mozambique in 2010, the work has reaped many fruits. In 2022, Especiosa Marge, who was welcomed by FWB, became the first university graduate of the Shelter Mozambique project. The young woman graduated in Biology and Chemistry. Her achievement has become an inspiration and a guiding light for the community. Two other young people, Racelina Mucavel and



Helton Mupote also completed the General Nursing course in 2022, but have not yet graduated, that is, they have not received their diploma yet. Currently, 14 young people - who arrived at the FWB as children - are at university and six are in line waiting for sponsorship to continue their studies.

Without continued nourishment our children would not have the energy, disposition, and

conditions to play, go to school, and dream of better days. Therefore, one of the most challenging points in the project is to make the land productive, which includes meetings with leaders and representatives of the region, searching for professionals and machinery in a country where nothing is manufactured, everything is imported.

The result of this tireless work is cause for much celebration! The local landscape is slowly changing with the machambas (vegetable gardens). In 2022 we harvested 134 tons of food: onions, garlic, cabbage, carrots, beets, cassava, pumpkins, corn, and beans.


In the reception centers in Muzumuia, Barragem, and Matuba, the harvests make it possible to offer meals five times a week to the shelters, which adds up to 3 thousand meals a day. In the other sheltering centers, we still need to keep the distribution of meals to three days a week, adding up to 33 thousand meals. In total, the Shelter Mozambique project offers 192 thousand meals per month.

Also in 2022, we increased to 19 the number of artesian wells - with the drilling of one in Barragem, which allows access to clean drinking water for at least 40,000 people. We continue to encourage the practice of sports, local culture with music and art workshops, we offer professional qualification with baking and sewing to provide independence and dignity.

ACT MADAGASCAR



In 2017 we arrived in the south of the island of Madagascar, in Ambovombe, the place that houses our first Reception Center. Since then, together, sponsors, volunteers, and supporters of the cause have welcomed brothers and sisters suffering one of the worst humanitarian crises in the world: hunger.

Currently, we welcome 12,690 people in our 11 Reception Centers, where we work to offer food, hygiene care, recreational and cultural activities,

work training, sewing workshops, carpentry, agroforestry, biochar, handicrafts, rust and ecological bricks. We have also implemented a bakery, for the production of bread for consumption by the local community providing income generation for the inmates involved in the production.

ACT MADAGASCAR



In 2022 we achieved one of the most important and necessary goals for our mission in Madagascar: Providing clean drinking water by drilling a well in the City of Fraternity. This achievement benefits the whole community! More than 150 meters deep, the well releases 3,900 liters of water per hour, which is three times the capacity planned at the beginning of the drilling project. Solar panels have been installed for the best functioning of the electric pump. In addition, a 4,000 liter water tank was installed to serve 30,000 people, and a truck was purchased to bring water to the farthest villages from the City of Fraternity. Water suitable for consumption improves the quality of life of our guests with conditions for personal hygiene, preparation of meals, and prevention of diseases such as diarrhea.

In 2022, our fraternity also reached the community of Ambaleandro. When we were there for the first time, 50% of the children were suffering from some kind of malnutrition. Sensitized and moved by the will to end world hunger, we opened a new nutritional center in the community. We provide food and treatment for more than 500 people.

We also had other works in the Madagascar Action Project, such as the construction of the Caravanners' House with the initial capacity for 24 people. We started the construction of the Madagascar school, which should be completed in 2023.



UBUNTU NATION

Next to the Dzaleka refugee camp in Malawi/ Africa, which houses about 52 thousand refugees in a space built for only 10 thousand people to live in, the Ubuntu Nation project emerges as a space where war refugees can find help and train themselves to gain independence.

In 2022, Fraternity without Borders decided to support refugee women, widows, and single mothers who must resort to prostitution as a way to support their children. The Mothers of the Field initiative was launched with the offer of employment in food cultivation within our Ubuntu Nation project. They prepare the land, plant and harvest the food that will be served to the whole community. Currently, they work in an area of 37 acres. In one year, 270 women have been sheltered and are getting a decent job and being rescued from an extreme situation of violence.

We could not take care of the mothers without also taking care of their children. Therefore, a day care center was built next to the plantation and babies and children up to three years old stay in a safe place with facilities for full-time care. The space has a dining room and a bathroom for the mothers. It is a complete support network, bringing peace to the women's day to day work.

The work fronts are several, among them the concern to also provide a safe home for families who arrive in Malawi and live in the transit area (space reserved to house war refugees until they can afford to build their own homes). FWB raises funds and does housing construction. In 2022, we reached 116 houses built and turned them over to the families who lived in the transit area. an action that has restored dignity and provided a safe home to hundreds of refugees.

The Ubuntu Nation school grows, welcomes, and provides opportunities for the educational, social, and mental development of children. There are 498 students enrolled and 100 babies in the day care center. Classes are held in 13 classrooms with two teachers in each one of them. All teachers and other school employees receive continuous pedagogical training based on the Montessori method. The children receive two meals a day - breakfast and lunch, as well as school supplies and uniforms.

UNIFORM AND SCHOOL SUPPLIES Five workshops are developed in the project: agroforestry, biochar, sewing, carpentry, and soap, which generate income for the beneficiaries and qualify them for work. Through these actions, the FWB has promoted jobs.

With 17 acres of land, the agro-forest develops the planting of beans, corn, and vegetables. The work guarantees the meals of the residents and volunteers in a healthier and more nutritious way, without agrochemicals.

The Biochar workshop conducted 50 training courses for refugees to generate income and reduce carbon emissions and deforestation. A storage structure for the biochar and drying space was also built.

The soaps produced by the project's beneficiaries received quality certification by the government of Malawi so that they could be marketed. Part of the soap produced goes to marketing generating income, and is also included in the food packages destined for families, children, and volunteer

Carpentry Workshop - through the workshop new classroom furniture is produced at Ubuntu School.

The sewing workshop has cabinets, showcase structure, cutting and sewing tables, machinery, and an independent solar energy system. Twenty training courses have been given to refugees for income generation.

BRAZIL, A HEART THAT WELCOMES

According to the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR), more than 4 million Venezuelans have left their country of origin to date, making this one of the largest displacement crises in the world today. There has been an 8,000% increase in the number of Venezuelans seeking refugee status worldwide since 2014, mainly in the Americas. According to data released in the 7th edition of the report "Refuge in Numbers", the nationality with the highest number of recognized refugees between 2011 and 2021 is Venezuelan (48,789), followed by Syrians (3,682) and Congolese (1,078).

In one year, Brazil received applications from people coming from 117 countries, the majority being Venezuelans (78.5%). Most Venezuelans arrive through the state of Roraima, in northern Brazil, making it the main gateway for these people to enter the country.

The project Brazil, a Heart that Welcomes was a pioneer in the region, even before the arrival of other organizations and the installation of Operation Acolhida (a Brazilian army operation set up in response to the refugee and migration crisis in Brazil).

In the year 2022, the work of the Project Brazil, a Heart that Welcomes was in five work fronts, four in the city of Boa Vista - capital of Roraima: the Reception Center Jardim Floresta, the Reception Center Pricumã, the Reception Center September 13 and the Sustainability Center



in co-management with UNHCR, and one in Pacaraima, municipality on the border between Brazil and Venezuela, with the Training and Reference Center.

Em 12 meses, pouco mais de 2.700 pessoas foram acolhidas nos três Centros de Sheltering that the FWB has managed in partnership with UNHCR. We had the commitment of 47 collaborators in the activities developed. Three meals a day were served by the Brazilian Armed Forces through the Humanitarian Logistics Task Force and 186 staple food kits were delivered with the support of UNHCR and the Catholic Church to refugee and migrant families in Pacaraima. A joint work and a lot of love!

In line with the shelters, the internalizations remain the main focus of the project's activities. In 2022, 138 family groups had their internalization processes completed, a total of 506 people with the opportunity to restart their lives in Brazil. Six family groups were internalized through the Social Reunion modality, through a Volunteer Host, and 22 family groups of people with disabilities were also internalized.

Eln 2022, we strengthened one of the FWB's values in the project Brazil, a Heart that Welcomes: sustainable processes. We inaugurated the Sustainability Center (in a partnership with UNHCR), which, being a neutral space, is frequented daily by the host community in Boa Vista and also by several agencies of Sheltering Operation (Operação Acolhida).

The site hosts community meetings, courses, lectures, and technical visits. In addition, the most important step in 2022 was the formation of the Sustainability Youth Committee. During the second semester, more than 20 young people joined the Committee, which was financed by the United Nations Youth Fund Initiative, and promoted training in the areas of citizenship, leadership, and sustainability.

Also in 2022, another important advance was in the number of attendances at the Reference Training Center in Pacaraima. The space was able to serve four times more people and provided access to livelihood services - a work front to promote the economic inclusion of refugees and migrants in the country of destination. It aims to guarantee the necessary means for the autonomous search for access to rights, self-sufficiency, and dignified forms of housing and work.

The most common initiatives are related to employability, entrepreneurship, financial inclusion, training capacity building. and Moreover, in partnership with UNHCR, the space has received a new training project for Community Promoters from four Brazilian indigenous communities in the region, which receive refugees and indigenous Venezuelan migrants. Thus, the training of Community Promoters aims to contribute to strengthening the aspects of community self-management, protection, documentation and access to services.

CHEMIM DU FUTUR

In Senegal, the Project Chemin Du Futur, supported by FWB provides education, housing, and food to vulnerable boys in the African country. The work is a ray of hope in the face of thousands of boys living on the streets in Dakar, the capital of Senegal.

In 2022, six boys were rescued and started to live together with the other 13 boys already in the project, all of them aged between nine and 18. In addition to attending regular school in the country throughout the year, in the house they receive English classes online through the Teaching Without Borders volunteers, tutoring with teachers for the younger ones, and with a hired teacher for the older ones..

For the first time, boys taken in by the project have reached the age to carry on with their lives outside of Chemin, but they continue to be accompanied and have the costs of their studies paid for by the project even outside of the orphanage.

O The Chemin du Futur Orphanage has been repainted and a computer room has been set up. The project has ten Senegalese collaborators, and there was a structuring in the areas of communication, fundraising, and events.

From January to October 2022, the bakery - called Chemin's social business - operated with production and sales to local commerce. An operational reorganization was also carried out, with the hiring of an administrative coordinator.

PORTRAITS OF HOPE



The Portraits of Hope project, supported by FWB since 2018, works in the hinterlands and other regions of extreme poverty in the state of Bahia, offering housing for families living in conditions of social vulnerability, tutoring, medical and psychological care, music and capoeira classes, with the help of volunteers.

Our work that started in Canudos, with Vila Esperança (Hope Village), currently shelters 244 families in the area, and has been gaining new houses, replacing the mud dwellings and offering a safe home to the sheltered families. Our goal is to offer quality of life to the needy community, through the distribution of water, basic sanitation, education, and income generation.

In 2022, we expanded our operations and reached other locations: in Valente with 48 sheltered families, Retirolândia with 38 families, and Jacobina with 34 families. In total, we welcomed 364 families.

Also in 2022, we delivered two more houses, one of them being the first in Jacobina! In total we have had 28 houses built with the effort of each sponsorship, donation and volunteer. And in Canudos we started the construction of a Geodesic to serve as a dining hall or service point

This same year, in Vila Esperança, we continued with the functioning of the Community Kitchen for the 20 children in the Educational Center. We received two caravans, one dental aid and the other general one. The health care continued periodically with one of our volunteers, as well as the donations of staple food kits, hygiene kits, and shoes.

With the 35 families assisted in the city of Jacobina, we have a space in the community of Alto Alegre, it is an old house that will be renovated. The space has already started to receive socioeducational workshops, music classes, lectures, environmental care, and planting seedlings with the children. Cine Esperança also shows movies to the community of Jacobina.

GARDEN OF BUTTERFLIES

In Caculé (in the state of Bahia - BA), FWB supports the NGO Garden of Butterflies, which takes in children diagnosed with Epidermolysis Bullosa (EB) - a rare disease that affects the skin and causes serious wounds. It is through sponsorship that these children receive help and assistance to treatment..

In 2022, 15 new shelterings were possible. The year started with 103 beneficiaries and ended with 118 from 23 Brazilian states, including the Federal District. Every month, each little butterfly receives a box with medication, dressings, and supplements that are essential for each one to ensure less pain and more comfort in the face of the disease.

The staff at Jardim das Borboletas is concerned with both the physical and psychological wellbeing as well as other aspects of the needs of the patients.

For example, in 2022, the project made different types of donations, such as air conditioning, prescription glasses, beds, ventilators, a cabinet to organize bandages, closets, nebulizers, a bathtub with support for bathing, maintenance of a motorized wheelchair, and a humidifier. In addition, it has helped to pay for renovations in the homes of the patients, dental treatment, hotel accomodation for exams, and laboratory tests for all the patients..

and was adapted for patient care. São Paulo is home to the best clinical and medical resources for the treatment of Epidermolysis Bullosa, and as the project serves patients from all over Brazil, the space helps the logistics of the patients.

The Casa de Apoio (Support House) has the capacity to house up to 14 patients and accompanying persons with the provision of meals, bathrooms, and bedrooms. In addition, a medical clinic is being set up for consultations and treatment of skin wounds. All the services will be offered free of charge.

The world statistic is 11 cases for every 1 million inhabitants; in Brazil the estimate is around 2,300 people with EB. The year 2022 brought a great achievement The cost of treatment varies from R\$10 to R\$60 thousand per month, depending on the number

MICROCEPHALY, LOVE WITHOUT DIMENSIONS

In 2022, we strengthened the mission of Microcephaly, Love without Dimensions, a project supported by FWB since 2017. The mission is to offer the most advanced rehabilitation, medical and nutritional care for the sheltered children in care. The physical Therapy services apply the Pediasuit, Bobath, and respiratory physical therapy methods, in addition to periodic biochemical, imaging, urodynamic, and polysomnography exams.

In Campina Grande - Paraíba, 126 children have been assisted, 90 of whom received rehabilitation follow-up with physical therapy, speech therapy, and occupational therapy. Another 36 children have received medical and nutritional support. In the work center of Belo Horizonte - Minas Gerais, 51 children were attended throughout 2022 with rehabilitation in physiotherapy, speech therapy and occupational therapy, in addition to medical and nutritional follow-up.

FOLLOW-UP

Throughout the year, the Project received children from seven Brazilian states: Alagoas, Rio Grande do Norte, Amazonas, Rio de Janeiro, Bahia, Pernambuco, and Minas Gerais. Foreign children were also assisted with medical care, including one Venezuelan and six Angolan children with telemedicine care.

The project's service areas include 21 professionals from Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, Biomedicine, Occupational Therapy, Nursing, Physical Education, Neuropediatrics, ENT, Dermatology, Pediatrics, Gynecology, and Nutrition.

During the reception, thickeners, food supplements, special milks, diapers, gastrostomy and nasal probes are also distributed.



FRATERNITY ON THE STREETS



The Fraternity in the Street project has started to transform the lives of homeless people in Brazil and in the United States. With four poles of action spread throughout Brazil in the states of Mato Grosso do Sul, Rio de Janeiro, Minas Gerais, and São Paulo, in 2022 the project expanded a new work front with the opening of the first part of the II unit of the Soul Clinic in Uberlândia - MG. The 2.5-hectare site was donated by a FWB volunteer and is approximately 13 kilometers from the urban area.

The first stage of construction was delivered during the 5th Meeting of Fraternity without Borders, in November. Three bedrooms, two bathrooms, a living room, a kitchen, and a laundry area were completed. The project foresees the construction of dozens of houses and the works evolve as the donations arrive.

In the United States, the project has gained another work front in Boston and thus now has four volunteer action poles, the others being Las Vegas, New York, and Denver.

In Uberlândia - MG, the volunteers of the Fraternity in the Streets Project delivered more than 46 thousand meals throughout the year 2022, most of them, 31 thousand, to homeless people and 14 thousand to families from communities assisted by the project. The actions also involved the delivery of 360 food staple kits, clothes, shoes, and hygiene kits. The solidarity bath continued to be offered and served 428 people, in addition to 300 haircuts. During the Warm Clothing Campaign, 1,239 blankets and warm clothing were collected and delivered.

In Rio de Janeiro – RJ, The Reference Reception Center completed two years of service with the offer of almost 34,000 meals at lunchtime, personal hygiene with baths, haircuts, clothing, dressings, medical, psychological, and social service appointments. The place also has a reading corner where 473 books were lent to the inmates, in addition to two workshops: feelings and crochetting.

In Campo Grande - MS, the Fraternity in the Street, in partnership with the Soul Clinic, welcomed, in 2022, 513 men in the men's shelter and 217 women in the women's shelter. All were homeless and addicted to drugs. The sheltered are offered five meals a day, lodging, clothes, medical and dental care, workshops, spiritual, emotional and physical support. In addition, the beneficiaries can participate in literacy and qualification courses; in 2022 there were five modalities, among them basic and advanced computer skills and cooking.

In São Paulo - SP, the work of the project Fraternidade na Rua (Fraternity in the Street) is carried out with different services and throughout 2022, once a month, an average of 100 services were provided to people living on the streets. In communities of greater social vulnerability, 400 families were assisted.

Every month, 100 snacks, clothes, and hygiene kits were donated, 700 basic food staple kits were delivered, five houses were furnished with the guarantee of social rent and defrayal of expenses, and 1.7 tons of food were collected in partnership with the Grupo Pão de Açúcar.


In the United States, the Fraternity in the Streets project has gained a new work center in the city of Boston, serving 220 people with soup, and delivering blankets, coats, and sleeping bags during the winter; and hot dogs and lemonade during the spring and summer.

In Las Vegas, the actions were fixed on Sundays where 12,700 people received a meal of spaghetti bolognese; juice; coffee; cookies, dessert, and a bottle of water.

In New York, every first Saturday of the month, 2400 people were given water, fruit, cookies, chocolates, juices, and sandwiches.

In Denver, every other Sunday, 4,300 people received bags with water, soda, sandwiches, two varieties of cookies, and a granola bar. Hygiene kits with toilet paper, wet wipes, deodorant, and sanitary napkins are also distributed to women.

FRATERNITY WITHOUT BORDERS ORCHESTRA

During the 5th Fraternity without Borders Meeting, the Orchestra Project announced news with the change of name from Emmanuel Youth Philharmonic Orchestra to Fraternity without Borders Orchestra; also, the new project coordination and the enrollment of 60 new students to start classes in January 2023.

Children from 7 years old onwards and teenagers up to 17 years old in socially vulnerable situations in Campo Grande - MS are the target audience of this project. They have the opportunity to learn and play string instruments (violin, classical viola, cello, and acoustic bass) and wind instruments (recorder, fife, and clarinet).

Classes are weekly, free of charge, and held at three project partner venues. As the students progress, they join the Fraternity without Borders Orchestra. Contact with music awakens new values and often transforms relationships with school, family, and friends.

The project has a permanent campaign to collect new instruments to help new students. The following instruments can be donated: violin, classical viola, cello, acoustic bass, clarinet, and transverse flute. Financial donations can also be made through the link:

ORPHANS OF CONGO

After a year of activities of the Congo Orphans Project in Bukavu, Democratic Republic of Congo, the first FWB reception center was opened there. Previously the reception place was rented. The new orphanage has the capacity for 140 people and has enabled the project to leap from 64 recipients to 100 (babies, children, teenagers, and young mothers in the safety of a home). The space has large rooms, a kitchen and an outdoor area with space for leisure and sports.

According to information from the DRC Security Forces, in the east of the country, about 120 militias are in conflict for the economic power of the area, which comes from the minerals that are found there. These conflicts affect the population, causing many deaths and leaving thousands of children and young people orphans. They work for one dollar a month, live on the streets, have no home, do not go to school, have nothing to eat or wear, no security, no care, and no love.

The Orphans of Congo Project has provided housing, education, medical care, and food with nutritional accompaniment, not to mention all the comfort and welcome that boys and girls need. All of this has been achieved through sponsorships, volunteers, and donors. For those who have not yet been taken in, due to financial limitations, FWB offers food and a change of clothes.

In this first year, Fraternity without Borders has supplied drinking water to about 2,000 households in Bukavu, that is, more than 15,000 people; and we are looking forward to expanding the area of operation so that we can welcome more and more children.

ACTIONS E EVENTS

In 2022, FWB and the strength of volunteering have taken up again the realization of face-to-face meetings with the Fraternity Walk, Building Fraternity, Talking about Fraternity in different Brazilian states, among them, Mato Grosso do Sul, Goiás, Rio Grande do Sul, Ceará and in other countries such as Canada, United States and Italy. The initiative provided a reflection on what fraternity is and the paths to be taken.

There were 89 actions by FWB volunteers, who also joined forces to collect donations for families affected by the rains in the states of Minas Gerais and Rio de Janeiro. Bazaars were held in the regions of São Paulo, Rio Grande do Sul, Pernambuco, Goiás, Mato Grosso and Rio de Janeiro. For the first time an Open Beach Tennis Without Borders, the making of calendars, production and donation of school notebook covers and materials; acquisition of two portable dental offices.

Volunteers of the Fraternity in the Street Project - Rio de Janeiro office, raffled off an official Flamengo jersey signed by the main players of the club and all the proceeds benefited the work of welcoming homeless people made by the project's volunteers.



The closing of the year 2022 was special with the V Fraternity without Borders Meetingwith the participation of 1,200 people in person and 6,500 views in live transmissions to share reflections, actions and many hugs. It was a three-day event, in Uberlândia - MG, with the theme Serve with Love and Purpose, approached through panels, lectures, exhibitions, testimonies and reflections by the participants and leaders of the 11 FWB projects..









BRAZILIAN TRANSFER PROJECTS SUPPORTED




TRANSFER OF INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS SUPPORTED









FRATERNITY ON THE STREETS - UBERLÂNDIA


